SCT meets regularly and is available for consultation if you would like to speak with someone about ways to best support a student and/or manage a student situation.

**THREAT ASSESSMENT TEAM (TAT)**

The purpose of the Threat Assessment Team (TAT) is to utilize national best practices to develop procedures and protocols for response to actual or potential violence. TAT members are trained to evaluate potential threats posed by students, faculty, staff and/or campus visitors, and decide upon

suitable response(s) for selected cases. TAT meets regularly and is available to discuss concerns about potential threats to the safety of our community.

To support the OSU community in navigating issues of bias, a team of faculty and staff comprise the Bias Response Team, who foremost provide care, consultation, guidance to individuals who have experienced or witnessed bias. The central goal of the Bias Response Team is the support and restoration of community members and as a university, we want to educate the community about the harmful effects of bias, and to provide care to community members who may be hurt or negatively affected by it. All OSU community members who experience or witness an act of bias are encouraged to submit a report to the Bias Response Team at [biasincidentreport.oregonstate.edu](http://biasincidentreport.oregonstate.edu). Even if you are not directly affected by an incident, someone else may be and it's important to let the Bias Response Team know when an incident occurs.

In addition, you may also speak to an after-hours counselor any time the office is closed.

OSU Student Health Services (SHS) provides leadership for health on campus and supports student success by providing student-centered, comprehensive healthcare. This includes treatment of chronic and acute medical conditions, psychiatric services, travel medicine, allergy and asthma care, nutrition counseling, immunizations, Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANE), and a 24-hour nurse advice line. SHS collaborates with CAPS, Disability and Access Services and other departments to offer comprehensive support for students with mental health concerns, including ADHD. Tebeau Hall houses a same-day clinic for minor medical conditions; appointments can be made by phone or on-line. SHS is dedicated to promoting lifelong healthy behaviors and healthy environments through Prevention, Advocacy and Wellness (PAW) programs. PAW offers evidence-based programming and outreach, including early intervention and chemical dependency assessment and referral, the [Collegiate Recovery Community](#), and many violence prevention and wellness programs.
